THAT EIGHT-HOUR LAW.

When Congress passed the Adamson bill, granting railroad men their demands of an eight hour day and when the threatened strike was called off early in September, the American public breathed easy again and settled back with the exclamation, "Well, that's settled!"

They were never more wrong. Instead of being settled, the fight has only begun. The railroads are not going to act in accordance with the demands imposed upon them by Congress. They claim that they cannot afford to do it and that to comply with the conditions of the law would mean ruination for them.

Be this as it may, the fact remains that there is going to be more trouble with the railroad employes at a very early date. As far as the effectiveness of the eight-hour law is concerned, we do not believe that it will amount to anything more than the bill which was passed in Congress some time before the Adamson bill and which provided for the support of the dependents of soldiers on the border. That bill was passed in a moment of hysteria and the Adamson bill was passed at a time when everything was in a rush and hurry to avoid s walk-out of the railroad men. Neither bill is sound in doctrine.
