ATHENS.—The Greek provisional government, headed by Premier Venizelos, today declared war on Bulgaria. It is expected that Venizelos will immediately put a large number of his forces in the field.

NEW YORK.—The steamer Powhatan, enroute from Boston to Norfolk, caught fire off Block Island early this morning. Wireless messages stated that the vessel carried passengers and freight. She is owned by the Merchants' Transportation Company. Coast Guard cutters are rushing to her assistance. The fire was reported under control at nine o'clock this morning.

### GERMAN DRIVE ON 'BUCHAREST STARTED

(By United Press)  
LONDON.—The German drive on Bucharest has apparently started. They are reported to be crossing into Debrudja. The reforming of the Rumanian lines in the Alt valley leads military experts to believe that the forces are being drawn together for one of the greatest struggles of the Balkan campaign.

## PEACE MOVE BREWING IN WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON.—The report that this government will soon take some step formally to urge peace in Europe was emphasized today by a long conference at the White House between President Wilson and Dr. Paul Ritter, Minister from Switzerland. The diplomat is understood to have assured the Chief Executive the Swiss government would lend every possible aid in an effort to end the war. It is known Dr. Ritter is anxious to have the peace delegates meet in Switzerland and he is believed to have urged it.  
It was admitted for the first time in official quarters today that President Wilson has his agents in the field and will launch a plan as soon as there is the slightest assurance that it can be made effective. No details of the conference with Dr. Ritter were made public.

"Any official statement at this time would be harmful," said a member of the White House family. "Not a day passes that the President does not have the matter under consideration, but it is too soon to talk."

### VIOLENT FIGHTING ALONG MACEDONIAN FRONT

SALONIKA.—Violent fighting along the entire Macedonian front with no changes in the general situation, is reported in a Serbian official statement.

### BORN WHEN JEFFERSON WAS U. S. PRESIDENT

WAXAHACHIE, Tex.—Mrs. Nelsa Burns, born when Thomas Jefferson was president of the United States, will celebrate her 110th birthday anniversary tomorrow. Her three daughters, the eldest of whom is 89, and many of her 110 grand and great grand children will be at the celebration. Mr. Burns died thirty years ago.

Born in Madison county, Tenn., Nov. 26, 1806, the now Mrs. Burns, whose maiden name was Yarborough moved to Texas with her father's family at the age of ten. She has lived in the Lone Star State since. Her earliest memories go back to the time of her arrival. She married John Washington Burns, a veteran of the Texas-Mexican and the Mexican war of 46-48. He later fought on the Confederate side in the Civil war.

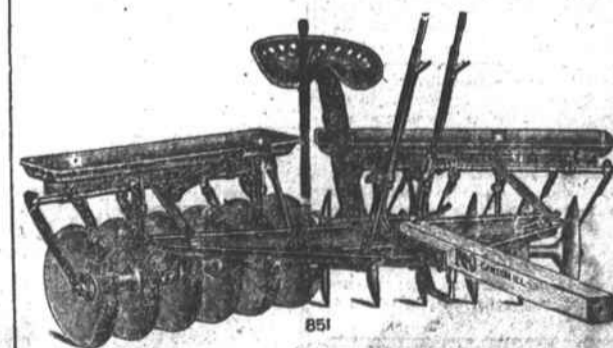
