Taxi Driver Kidnaped, Robbed Of His Money

H. C. Jolly, Of Chadbourn, Relieved Of Money By Two Unidentified Men On Tuesday Night, After Being Kidnaped

Kidnaped by two unidentified men, robbed and abandoned 100 miles from his home, H. C. Jolly, Chadbourn taxi driver, returned to that place yesterday morning unharmed after a harrowing experience.

His car was taken, with him as passenger, and driven to a point beyond Bennettsville, S. C., where he was released.

In the early evening Jolly was engaged to carry the men to Tabor City, a distance of about 13 miles. Arriving there they told Jolly their destination was a few miles further on. Out from Tabor City on the Green Sea Road the taxi man was ordered to stop.

Alighting from the car, one of the men drew a revolver and pressed it against Jolly's ribs, informing him "This is a hold-up; hand over your money." The taxi driver gave them \$5 or \$6, all the money he carried at this time. They returned to the car, with one of the robbers taking the steering wheel, while the other sat directly behind Jolly. Through Green Sea, Nichols, Dillon and Bennettsville they drove. Out from Bennettsville a few miles the gas supply exhausted. The machine was abandoned and Jolly was forced to march ahead of the robbers about a mile. He was carried into the forest and left unharmed save from fright.

A passing motorist later carried Jolly to Bennettsville, where the sheriff of Marlboro County was informed of the occurrence and began work on the case. Mr. Jolly is confident he can identify the men in case of arrests. At last reports no arrests had been made.

Corb Strickland Is Fatally Shot

Another Member Of Desperado Family Comes To Violent End Sunday Afternoon In The "Jamb" Section Of This County; Slayer Exonerated

Chadbourn, April 24. — Corb Strickland, farmer, about 35, was fatally wounded late Sunday afternoon in a shotgun attack alleged to have been inflicted by Duckery Coleman, young farmer of Horry County, S. C. The slaying occurred at the home of Coleman, who lives near the North Carolina line in what is known as the "jamb" section of the two states. Coleman is alleged to have shot Strickland in self-defense after Strickland had already fired upon Coleman, who was in his bed at the time.

Bad feeling had existed between the two men for some time over Strickland's attention to a sister of Coleman. Strickland, a married man, several months ago eloped with the Coleman girl and remained away for several months. Returning Strickland went back to his wife. The girl returned to Duckery's home. Coleman had repeatedly warned Strickland to keep away from his place.

Sunday afternoon armed with a shotgun, Strickland went to Coleman's house. Arriving there he is said to have immediately opened fire upon Coleman, who returned the shot with fatal results.

A coroner's jury went to the scene late Sunday evening. Upon hearing the evidence a verdict of justifiable homicide was rendered, it being found that Cole-

man fired in defense of his life and in protection of his home.

Corb Strickland had a long and colorful criminal record in Columbus and Horry counties. He was a son of Carson Strickland, who several years ago was slain

by another son, Mack Strickland, who last summer was killed by a brother, Cliff Strickland, in Robeson county.
