

Cashier's Office HOLC In Raleigh

**Opened For Convenience
Of Borrowers In Making
Re-Payments On Their
Loans**

Raleigh, May 24—Attention of all home owners, whose mortgages are held by the Home Owners' Loan Corporation, is today called to the fact that the Corporation is maintaining a Cashier's office in Raleigh for their convenience in making payments.

The Cashiers' Office was opened a few weeks ago in order to serve home owners in the 27 counties comprising the Raleigh District of the Corporation, and a complete record of all accounts is now being kept in the Raleigh office so that those who have been unable to get their payment problems settled by mail may consult with the teller on duty at the Raleigh Office. Prior to the opening of the Raleigh office here, all payments had to be mailed direct to the Regional office at Atlanta, and the new arrangement has found favor, it was stated, with mortgagors because it is more convenient for them to deal with the Raleigh office. It was added that apparently information that the office was open in Raleigh had not reached all home owners. A teller is on duty daily from nine o'clock to four o'clock, except on Saturday, when the hours are from nine o'clock to one o'clock, in the offices located in the post-office building here. Payments may be made by mail as well as over the counter, it was said, and these payments will be credited to the accounts of borrowers who find themselves unable to come to the Raleigh office to make their payments.

According to Fred Moore the dead negro suddenly stopped work and bent over, holding his head in his hands. He fell over into the knee-deep water in which he was searching for clams and the other two darkies carried him to the boat. It was low tide and his two companions sat in the boat with him, unable to get him across the river for medical attention.

Frink died about the middle of the morning, approximately an hour after the attack. It was afternoon before the tide had risen enough for Moore and the other Frink negro to start home with the body of the dead man. They reached the Quarantine Station at 2 o'clock.

Ed Weeks, acting coroner, was called when the boat landed but he decided that an inquest would be unnecessary.

Funeral services for the dead negro will be conducted from the St. James African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church this (Wednesday) afternoon.

He declared that the Brunswick County hospital was built about
