

### Amendments To Safeguard AAA

Statement Issued By Secretary Wallace Reassuring Farmers Of Continuation Of National Farm Program

The following letter was received last week by County Agent J. E. Dodson relative to the present status of the AAA and copies are being mailed to production control committeemen of Brunswick county:

"Your attention is called to the following statement, relating to the recent Supreme Court NRA decision, which is of importance to all producers in your community who are contract signers. This statement was made public on June 5 by Secretary Wallace with the approval of President Roosevelt.

"In cooperation with leaders of Congress, amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment Act are being perfected which are intended to bring the Act's provisions as to marketing agreements and licenses into line with Schechter case decision and also to safeguard the farmers' voluntary adjustment program on basic commodities.

"These voluntary adjustment programs were not in the path of the Schechter case decision, and in no event could there be any question of the Government's ability to fulfill its contracts with farmers.

"Nevertheless, we have taken advantage of the decision to seek perfection in the law which will make certain the Government's authority to continue processing tax rates in accordance with amended provisions of the Act."

(Continued from page 1.) 1936 program, should one be favored, has not yet been definitely decided, each ballot has on the back outline of the principal features under consideration for possible incorporation in a new law-cured program. These features are: Provision for maintaining production around level of consumption inasmuch as surplus stocks have been removed. Rate of reduction from base not to exceed 35 percent. Payments at such rates as would tend to make the domestically consumed portion of total production under contract bring a return to producers of an amount equal to the parity price, or fair exchange value. Use of previously established base with adjustment downward in accordance with reasonable standards by not more than 10 percent for any growers whose bases are exceptionally large as compared with the bases established by other growers whose situation is similar. Acreage obtained by this reduction and some additional acreage to be used for upward adjustments in accordance with reasonable standards for growers whose bases are abnormally low.

### FORT JOHNSON TO BE LEASED BY U. S. WAR DEPT.

(Continued from page one) of War, will be issued to the successful bidder, under Act of Congress, approved July 28, 1892 (27 Stats., 321), with the privilege of relinquishment by the lessee at the end of any yearly rental period.

1. The lessees shall pay to the United States the rent above reserved at the times above mentioned and shall also pay to the United States on demand any sum which may have to be expended after the expiration, revocation, or relinquishment of this lease in putting the said premises or property in as good condition for use by the United States as it was at the date of first occupancy by the lessee.

2. On the expiration, of this lease, unless renewed for a further period, the lessee shall remove immediately any buildings or other property that he may have on the said premises; and on revocation of the lease by the Secretary of War, or its formal relinquishment by the lessee as hereafter provided, the lessee shall remove the said buildings or other property within such time as the Secretary of War may designate. Upon the lessee's neglect, refusal, or inability to remove said buildings or other property as aforesaid, the same shall either become the property of the United States without liability of any kind to the lessee, or the Secretary of War may cause them to be removed at the expense of the lessee, and no claim for damage against the United States or any agent or officer thereof shall be created by or made on account of such removal.

3. All work done upon the premises leased thereby shall be subject to the approval of the District Engineer of the Engineer Department at Large, in charge of the locality, and at his election shall be done under his supervision.

4. The lessee shall have the right to relinquish this lease at the end of any annual rental period, upon giving to the Secretary of War at least sixty days' notice thereof in writing.

5. The lessee shall neither commit nor suffer any waste on the premises, and shall use reasonable care to prevent injury to the timber on the land by trespassers or others.

6. This lease is not transferable.

7. The removal of sand or earth of any kind from the said

premises will not be permitted. 8. The house shall be used for residential purposes only. 9. Any structures which may be constructed on the premises hereby leased shall be kept in a good state of repair at all times, shall be used only for such purposes as shall be approved by the District Engineer, U. S. Army, in charge of the locality, and the grounds in the vicinity of the said structures shall, at all times, be kept in a Sanitary condition.
