# CHAPTER 4

## PEACE and GOOD ORDER

SECTION 34.—No person, firm or corporation licensed to sell beer, larger beer, ale, Porter, fruit juices and, or, light wines, containing two and three tenths (2.3-10) alcohol by weight, or such other percentage as may conform to any act of the Legislature of North Carolina, shall sell, or offer for sale any of the above named drinks within the City Limits between the hours of 12 p. m. Saturday until 6 o'clock a. m. Monday.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall be fined FIFTY DOLLARS.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted to take effect on and after Monday, the 2nd day of September, 1935.
