Hot weather, following the recent rains, has caused tobacco to ripen more rapidly than the growers can find barn room for curing the leaf.

The Weaver Brothers of Catawba county have been asked to go to Buncombe county and plan an electric generating plant similar to the home-made plant on their farm, reports county agent T. L. Robinson.

A total of 375,000 feet of broad base terraces have been built for farmers in Iredell county at an average cost of \$1.20 an acre.

Calf club members in Stanly county are busy preparing their animals for showing at the State Fair this fall. Two girl members are leading the way, says County agent Artz.

With crops laid by, many farmers in Piedmont counties are making tours of their own and neighboring counties to inspect farming operations on demonstration farms.

Recent rains in Nash county will increase the tobacco yield by

100 to 150 pounds an acre, reports County Agent H. G. Wharton.

Much cotton in Sampson County has been planted for the third time with a poor stand still being secured.

Catawba county sweet potato growers are selling their cured sweets at the storage houses for \$1 a bushel.

The County Board of Agriculture and the county cotton and tobacco committees are co-operating to build the agriculture of Pitt county. The three committees met recently are proposing a budget for the farm work of the county.

Rental checks amounting to \$16,852.32 have been received and delivered to cotton growers in Bertie county who signed adjustment contracts last year. Checks for 1935 signers are expected within a few days, says County Agent B. E. Grant.

Starting with six pairs of Louisiana Giant bull frogs, J. C. Adcock of Wake county expects to supply frog legs to ail comers within the year.

Cotton growers in eastern North Carolina are reporting heavy infestations of boll weevils on low lands. Some of the cotton on high lands shows a slight damage.

Dairy farming is increasing in Haywood county, according to observations by county agent W. D. Smith.

Nearly 10,000 pounds of poultry has been shipped co-operatively in Lincoln county during the past month with the growers receiving \$1,380 in cash at the car door.

Two more pure bred Guernsey heifers have been placed with 4-H club members of Polk county this month.

George Garmon of Matthews, route 2, Union county, has a trap nested pen of White Leghorns in which the hen laid 304 eggs and 14 of her pullets laid over 200 eggs each during their pullet year.

The rarer fertilizing elements seem to be paying in field demonstrations with celery being conducted in Transylvania county by farm agent Glazepe.

Alfalfa, lespedeza, corn and cotton have tripled in growth in Mecklenburg county since the recent rains.

"We have the finest prospects for corn, hay, cane, peas, soybeans and sweet potatoes than in several years," says Rutherford county agent Patton.

The 4,000 acres of lespedeza in Person county give promise of fertile fields and good crops in the future, says the farm agent. An agricultural society has been organized in Wayne county to promote rural welfare, home beautification, rural electrification and better marketing.
