SCHOOL SYSTEM IS IN TWO UNITS

Crowded Conditions At The Shallotte School Led To Building Of The Supply Grammar School In 1933; Under The Same Head

By Henry C. Stone, Principal Shallotte school ended its first month with the largest enrollment in the history of the school. One hundred forty-eight have registered in the high school and seven hundred sixty-three in the grades. Twenty-four teachers have these in charge—five in the high school and eighteen in the grades Since the school began nine

years ago the enrollment has been increasing each year. In 1930 the old Shallotte school building was repaired, and two plan Literary classrooms were fixed in it. With the use of these the school was able to take care of the increase for about two years.
