Farm Questions

Question: What will be the amount of the first payment made to tobacco growers signing the new contract?

Answer: A minimum payment of \$1.00 per 100 pounds of base tobacco production will be made as soon as possible after the contract is signed. Additional payments will depend upon the price of tobacco, and will be the amount which, when added to the farm price, will bring the returns to not less than parity on the quantity of tobacco used domestically. Tenants and sharecroppers will share in the special payments in the same proportion as their interest in the 1936 crop.

Question: How can I get rid of yellow color in eggs from my poultry flock?

Answer: Shell color is inherited and the best way to eliminate the color is not to set any eggs showing tinted shells. When breeding for future egg producers head your flock with males from a source where this trouble does not exist. If the eggs with colored shells show to a large extent it might be well to do no breeding from the present flock. Keep the present flock for egg production only and get some new breeding stock from another flock that does not produce colored eggs.

Spurns Peace

Benito Mussolini, contemptuous of sanctionist nations, drove Italy at full speed down the war path Saturday. The advocate of the motto, "Live dangerously," spurned any thought of peace in Ethiopia except at his own terms. He pressed the fight against the economic wall his fellow nations and former allies have built about him.

Awakes

Awakened from a four-year sleep, Victor Cleaves said Saturday he and his family would celebrate on Christmas what his friends called his "coming back from the dead." Cleaves, a railway employe who was suffering from shell shock in the World War, began to doze over his meals in 1931. Then he fell asleep. Doctors, unable to rouse him, had to inject nourishment into his body. The beating of his heart was one of the few evidences that he continued to live.

Hattie Robinson, colored, pleaded guilty of assault and given 30 days in jail, this sentence being suspended upon payment of the costs.

Johnie Beck, white, came before the court on an appeal from a justice's court on a charge of false pretense. The action was not pressed and the appeal dismissed.

Clarence Jones, colored, pleaded guilty of transporting and judgment was suspended upon payment of the costs.

Lee Jenkins, colored, was found not guilty of larceny.

Colin Keer, white, was found guilty of reckless operation of a motor vehicle. He was required to pay the costs in the case and restitution to owners of property damaged by his machine.

W. W. Skipper, white, was found not guilty of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor.

Joe Bellamy, colored, was tried on charges of assault and escape. He was given 6 months on the former charge and 30 days for the latter offense when found guilty.

G. V. Fesperman, white, was

charged with robbery. The state of its own motion moved to discharge for want of probable cause. Motion was granted and the defendant was discharged.

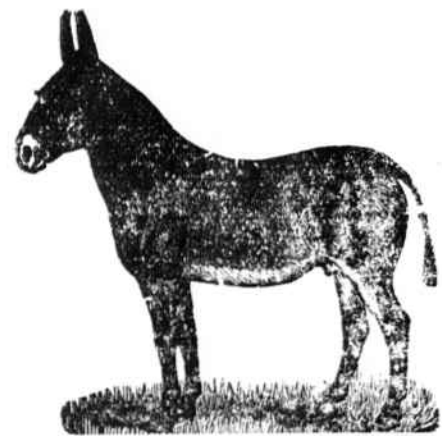
WPA FORCES ARE LOOKING FOR MERRY CHRISTMAS
