Scholarship For Many Accidents Don't Happen; Cause For Most Of Them Machine

In a recent interview, H. P. Hobart, General Manager of Gulf's Lubricating Sales Department, used a report of the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue to substantiate his belief that many accidents are caused by improper lubrication or by the lack of lubrication. In analyzing this report, Mr. Hobart said, "Out of 80,488 motor vehicles involved in accidents, over 90 per cent were apparently in good condition. Senator And Mrs. Cameron Morrison Offer 4-Year Scholarship To State College For Calf Club Boys

The four-year scholarship to State College offered annually by Senator and Mrs. Cameron Morrison has been renewed for this year and will be awarded this fall to the North Carolina 4-H calf club member making the best record with Jerseys.

The Morrison Scholarship is open to all bona fide Jersey calf club members from 10 to 20 years old who will have completed two or more years of calf club work, said L. R. Harrill, 4-H club leader at the college.

The entire Jersey record of each member seeking the scholarship will be considered in selecting the winner, whether it be two, three, four, or more years, Harrill pointed out.

To compete for the scholarship, the club member must exhibit a calf at the State calf club show to be held in connection with the State Fair next October. In the event that no fair is held, another time and place for the exhibit will be designated.

The following score card will be used in determining the winner: (1) As shown by the club member's record book—his financial gain, 30 points; dairy management, 10 points; leadership activities 10 points. (2) Type and condition of animal exhibited, 35 points; club member's showmanship ability, 15 points.

Selection of the winner and the awarding of the scholarship will be made under the supervision of the 4-H club department of the State College agricultural extension service.

The scholarship is offered annually by former Senator and Mrs. Cameron Morrison to stimulate more interest in high quality 4-H calf club work, Harrill stated. The scholarship will be available next fall, and must be put into use not later than the beginning of the fall semester in 1937. Otherwise, it will revert to the scholarship fund.

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Broadcast Plans For 4-H Club Camp

The story of the National 4-H Club Camp will be told by 4-H Club members, Federal and State extension leaders during two radio programs to be broadcast on Monday, June 22, and Wednesday, June 24.

The National 4-H Camp, to which are eligible two 4-H club boys and two 4-H club girls chosen from each State because of their excellent records as club members, will be held in Washington, D. C., from June 18 to 24. The camp is held annually to help 4-H club members to become better acquainted with the work and facilities of the department of agriculture, to study their government, and to confer with representative leaders and members from all parts of the country.

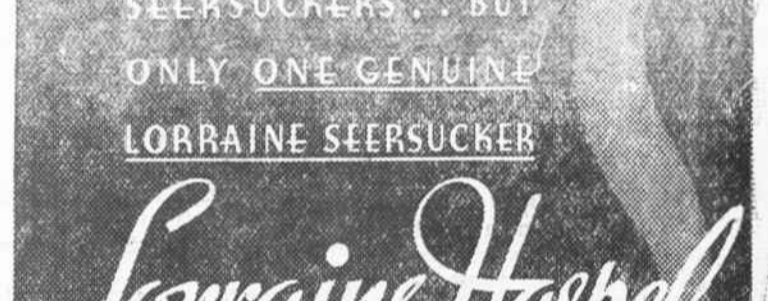
