Road To Caswell Asphalt Surface

Members Of State Highway Maintenance Department Moved Their Camp Here Thursday And Began Work Friday

HARD SURFACE TO EXTEND TO BRIDGE

Link Of Almost Three Miles Will Be A Boon To Beach Travelers; Ef-fort Being Made To Have Work Continued

Members of the maintenance department of the State Highway Commission began work Friday hardsurfacing the Caswell Beach road from the intersection with highway No. 130 to the draw bridge over the inland waterway. The project calls for two and seven-tenths miles of hard sur-
