The captain of the yacht came ashore and visited the Brunswick county courthouse, where the election returns were being received. He appeared delighted that President Roosevelt was being swept back into office on a landslide. He said that he was with the President for a few days last summer and that "he is a fine fellow."

The visit here of the captain of the vessel occasioned some excitement, as it was quickly whispered around that James Roosevelt was in Southport. This rumor was quickly branded as false.
