Not Too Early To Begin Garden

Mistake To Neglect The Garden During The Winter Months, And Now Is Time To Make Plans And Preparations

We can now begin to think in earnest of our gardens. The garden should by no means be neglected during the winter months, but we do not feel that we are really gardening until we plant seed or set plants.

Do not plant the same crop in the same place it grew last year. Rotation is just as important in the garden as it is in the field, it not only tends to increase the yield but aids greatly in keeping in check many harmful diseases.

Cabbage plants should be set this month. A liberal application of a good commercial fertilizer should be worked into the soil before the plans are set and they should receive of three side applications of readily available nitrogen during the growing season. Lettuce should be planted also and treated in the same manner as cabbage.

The following seed can be planted: Beets, spinach, carrots, mustard and garden peas. Either Thomas Laxton or Laxtons Progress are good varieties of peas. All garden crops should be liberally fertilized. Compost is splendid but should be well rotted and put out during the winter. Commercial fertilizer analyzing around 5 per cent ammonia, 7 per cent phosphoric acid and 5 per cent potash is good and should be applied at the rate of 1500 to 2000 pounds per acre.

If the trees in the home orchard have not been pruned and sprayed this should be done immediately. Liquid lime-sulphur is very satisfactory as a dormant spray for fruit trees. Mix this with water at the rate of one gallon of lime-sulphur with eight gallons of water. If the liquid is not available then the dry lime-sulphur may be used as directed on the package. This spray is for the control of San Jose scale and leaf curl.

Fertilize the home orchard with compost where available. In using commercial fertilizer use 1/2 pound of nitrate of soda on apple and nut trees one year old and increase the amount 1/2 lb. per tree each succeeding year. On peaches, pears and plums use 1/4 pound of nitrate of soda or its equivalent and increase the amount 1/4 lb. per year. Bearing trees will require nitrogen approximately equal to 1/2 pound of nitrate of soda or 2 pounds of 5-7-5 fertilizer per inch diameter of the trunk. The application should be mixed with the upper 6 inches of soil and scattered over the entire surface as far as the branches extend.

He leaves ten grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, and other relatives.

Hogs Need Green Feed In Winter

This Diet During Winter Months Will Help Keep Swine In Vigorous And Healthy Condition

Green feed will help keep the swine herd vigorous and healthy during the winter months.

When possible, hogs should be allowed to graze on green forage. If pasturage is not available, a green, leafy, legume hay should be fed, said H. W. Taylor, extension swine specialist at State College.

Green feed contains vitamin A, which is essential for healthy swine, he continued. Alfalfa, soybean, and lespedeza hays make good winter feed.

Taylor also warns growers not to let pigs feed too long on soybean and peanut fields, as this tends to produce soft, oily pork that is not desirable for home consumption or for marketing.

After pigs have reached a weight of 85 pounds, they should be put on a feed of corn and fish meal or tankage. Cottonseed meal may be mixed with the fish meal or tankage, in equal parts, if desired.

Hogs like cottonseed meal, it helps stimulate their appetites, and it is a good "hardening ration," he explained.

The corn and protein supplement should, of course, be balanced with an abundance of leafy, green feed, he said.

This ration, if fed until the pigs attain a weight of 200 to 225 pounds, will produce pork that is firm and well marbled, Taylor pointed out.

He emphasized that when hogs are fed a softening ration for a long time, they cannot be made to produce good, firm meat by feeding them corn for a few weeks.
