



> **Free Range For Cattle** And Hogs Still Existant

> > Head. They are still there Their elimination is an immediate problem and this can be done without any extensive head scratching 'to conjure up ways and means. In the days of the passing

of free range vengeance was taken on the tick by dipping cattle in a tick-dip solution. This method will not be effective on Bald Head for the reason that there are now no cattle there. The ticks are there but all they have to prey upon is wild hogs and other wild animals. The tick does not fancy pork and, besides, the only hogs that can be caught are some of the tiny pigs. Dipping against the tick is not practical. Sheep seem to be the an-

swer to the present need. A flock of 200 or more of these animals would quickly perform a most valuable service by ridding the island of much of the undesirable undergrowth. At the same time they would be poison to the tick. The sheep would gather the tick parasites from the bushes and grass, but the pests would quickly die without injury to the sheep.
