**DROP**  
 The government index of prices for farm products dropped two points during the past month, falling to 94 per cent of pre-war in mid-January as compared with 96 on December 15 and with 102 on January 15 a year ago.

**SAVED \$163,000**  
 Farm Agents of the State College Extension Service estimate that North Carolina swine growers saved \$163,000 in 1938 as a result of extension educational work in better hog marketing.

**CONTROL EROSION**  
 Erskine Huskins of Newdale, Yancey County, notes that the least soil erosion from the open land on his farm is where he has a good alfalfa sod. No apparent erosion can be seen there, he reported to W. C. Maness, county agent.

**CATTLE INCOME**  
 Ten years ago, Jeter P. Ramsey of Madison County bought two three-month-old, pure bred Hereford heifers for \$30 a head. These heifers have dropped 6 bull calves and two heifer calves since that time. The bull calves were sold for \$50 each and the two heifers are now worth \$100 each. "This was one of the best paying investments I ever made," Mr. Ramsey said.

**POTATO COOPERATIVE**  
 A small cooperative association has been formed by a group of sweet potato growers in Nash County to market their surplus sugar spuds. Forty growers will take part and the steering committee is now at work.

**GRAZING CROPS**  
 There are 197 Currituck farmers who are providing winter grazing crops for their pigs. This means healthy pigs, grown under sanitary conditions and more profits to the growers, says L. A. Powell, county agent, who reports 574.9 acres of winter cover crops planted largely for this purpose.

**MORE JERSEYS**  
 Three new 4-H Jersey calf club members have signed up in Wake County and have secured pure bred heifers. This makes 14 boys and girls with pure bred heifers in the county club.

Protection of Crops and Livestock Against Bears:  
 It shall be lawful for any landowner, lessee, or tenant, for the protection of his crops or livestock, to run, hunt or take bears at any time of the year in Brunswick County, and Washington County.

It shall be unlawful to trap or hunt opossum, raccoon, or muskrat in Brunswick County at any time except from November 15 to February 15.
