—NOTICE— RABIES VACCINATION

In compliance with Chapter 122 Public Laws, 1935, all owners or keepers of dogs are required under penalty of law to have said dogs vaccinated against rabies. All dogs over six months of age must be vaccinated between April 1, 1939, and July 1, 1939. The fee for this vaccination, if done by one of the regularly appointed inspectors, is fifty cents, provided the dog is vaccinated at a regular appointment; seventy-five cents otherwise. Full credit for the fifty cents will be given the owner on his 1939 dog tax.
