(Continued From Page 1) she could be and about to go all to pieces." Coroner contacted the parents by telephone and informed them that the body had been recovered.

The boy's father was captain of the dredge, operated by the Hill Dredging company, at work in the inland waterway, north of Little river.

Harvell said that they were not looking for the body but were riding up the beach in an automobile when he sighted it. The body was about one mile from the inlet where the Shallotte river empties into the ocean. Harvell was visiting his son at Holden's beach.

The body was taken to the Yopp funeral home in Wilmington and arrangements were made to ship the body to May's Landing.

The boy is survived by his parents.

He was reported to have drowned about 2 o'clock Monday afternoon while playing about a boat in the inland waterway. A short time prior to his disappearance, he was playing around the beach where some people were digging clams.

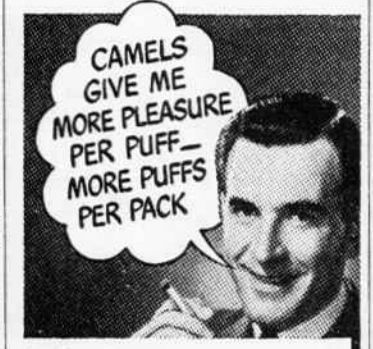
