WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Two social gatherings over the weekend at which President Roosevelt was the guest of newspaper men have riveted attention of politicians and diplomats on the vivid contrasts between the American way and governments overseas. Here the head of government accepted invitations to dinners at which he knew full well his policies and personality would be depicted in song and buffoonery of the "razzing" type. Many observers noted that criticism, even amusing barbs, directed against a dictator across the water would send the perpetrator to a stone wall or a concentration camp.

While our foreign policies are claiming much of the President's time, the domestic phases are taking a turn which annoys Cabinet officers and their lesser aids. It is reliably reported that the Budget Bureau has been applying the axe to departmental estimates in an effort to show an economy move within the Administration. The Department of Agriculture and the Civilian Conservation Corps are reported to have sustained a 20 per cent slash with White House approval. This development is good news for the House Appropriations Committee in its gunning for excessive demands for money with which to operate Federal agencies.
