Questioned regarding proposed project extensions, Superintendent Bishop said that a total of 110 miles of additional line has been requested. "The basic principal of the

REA is to provide energy to peofort and convenience afforded by the availability of electrical energy", said the project superintendent. "However, it is evident because of the cooperative nature of the project, inasmuch as each op closer understanding between neighbors and communities."
