Eligibility to the Auxiliary, Mrs. Carr explained, is based upon World War service of the family. If the husband, son, father or brother served in the war and is a member of the American Legion, the woman is eligible. The mothers, widows, sisters and daughters of men who lost their lives in the war are, of course, eligible, as are those of veterans who have died since the war. Women who themselves were regularly enlisted in war service, such as army nurses and navy yeomanettes, are eligible to both

the Legion and Auxiliary. A number of the women who previously have not exercised their right to Auxiliary membership will come into the Unit this year, said Mrs. Carr. A number of others who formerly belonged are coming back into active membership. The Unit is looking forward to one of the most successful and interesting years in its history.

was distributed in this county to July 1 in four of the five major divisions of the Act, exclusive of Old Age and Survivors Insurance.

In the other five divisions, classed as "services", approximately \$3,032.00 has been distributed in this county, including about \$1,030.00 in Child Welfare Services and about \$2,002.00 in Vocational Rehabilitation.

Disbursement of funds in the other three "services" is made through county or district health departments, and only 76 of the 100 counties having such departments June 30, 1940, participated in this distribution. (Three other counties, Gates, Lincoln, and Rockingham—started

organized health work as of July 1, 1940, but did not share in the funds in the period being considered). Twenty-four counties, therefore, received practically no funds in these divisions, and what they would have received, and didn't, increased the funds to counties with health departments.

Brunswick County, with no health department, received nothing for Maternal and Child Health; nothing for Service to Crippled Children; and nothing in Public Health Work.

These five "service" division reports are approximate. The 1940 Census figures of 3,561,990 for the State and 16,770 for this county were used in prorating the funds, made up of Federal allotments, matched by the State and counties.

Brunswick County, Central UCC office records show, has 12 resident employers subject to the Unemployment Compensation law and 371 workers protected by it. Liable resident employers paid \$17,371.58 into the State fund in 3 1/2 years, ending last June 30, as compared with \$15,935.22 in benefits drawn in 2 1/2 years, also ending June 30, by resident working in the county.

The records show that in 30 months of payments, unemployed workers in the county filed 608 initial claims—the first claims filed after becoming unemployed—and 4745 continued claims—claims filed weekly after the initial claims.

Employment Service records indicate that in the 3 1/2 years, through June 30, 3,825 registrations for work and 548 placements in jobs were handled in the county.

While here he will do everything he can to aid the Chamber of Commerce in arranging for a fishing tournament next summer. Meanwhile, his column in the Daily News is constantly preaching about the great fishing at Southport.
