sentence.

The young man, who was serving 35 days imposed on him in Brunswick superior court, was originally charged with breaking and entering. While awaiting trial at Southport, he broke jail, and was subsequently recaptured. He was sentenced to 35 days, for escape, and upon his return to jail, tried to take his own life.
