when the grand jury failed to find a true bill.

Herbert Rogers, former chief of police for the city of Southport, was found not guilty of charges of assault. This case grew out of the arrest of John Creech, prosecuting witness, on charges of drunkenness. Creech charged that the officer hit him with a black-jack without cause or provocation, but after three hours deliberation the jury returned its verdict acquitting Rogers.

Edgar Henderson, the young man who suffers from chronic claustrophobia whenever he gets in jail, was given not less than 2 years nor more than three years at hard labor in the state penitentiary after he had pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering and larceny.

is still qualified to perform the duties of such position, and (3) makes application for reemployment within 40 days after he is relieved from such training and service—

"(A) if such position was in the employ of the United States Government, its Territories or Possessions, or the District of Columbia, such person shall be restored to such position or to a position of like seniority, status, and pay;

"(B) if such position was in the employ of a private employer,

such employer shall restore such person to such position or to a position of like seniority, status, and pay unless the employer's circumstances have so changed as to make it impossible or unreasonable to do so."
Director Metts then pointed out that the only thing required of the soldier, in order to take advantage of these facilities provided to aid in his reemployment, is that he shall furnish information requested on forms which will be distributed by the Army, and that he shall get in touch with the Reemployment Committeeman attached to the local board as soon as he returns home.


