

Thirty Places Have Licenses

Places Where Beer Is Sold Must Be Approved By Brewers and N. C. Beer Distributors Committee

RALEIGH, Oct. 6.—There are 30 establishments in Brunswick county licensed by the State Department of Revenue to sell beer at retail.

Figures, compiled by the Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee, show that the state has issued retail licenses to 4,318 dealers in 98 North Carolina counties as of October 1. The tax year for beer licenses begins May 1.

Mecklenburg county's 304 easily tops Guilford's 233. Forsyth county is third with 182, and Wake fourth with 175. Others in order are New Hanover 152, Buncombe 149, Durham 144 and Cumberland 132.

These licenses have been issued by the state revenue department since the tax year (for beer) began last May 1, and it is anticipated that the number will exceed 5,000 before the tax year ends April 30.

County Children Invited To Fair

Twelve Thousand School Children Of Columbus County Are Issued Invitation To Attend Fair Friday, October 17

Superintendent Annie May Woodside of Brunswick county schools, today joined State Superintendent of Public Instruction Clyde A. Erwin and Governor Broughton in urging as many as possible of the 5,000 students in the Brunswick schools to attend the State Fair at Raleigh, October 14-18.

"Young North Carolinians' Day" will be observed at the fair on Friday, October 17, and all students will be admitted for three cents each, the amount of a National Defense tax levied by Congress, effective October 1.

"I am particularly anxious for the children of the State to have an opportunity to review the Fair", Dr. Erwin declared. "In times like these we need to do everything possible to stimulate a spirit of understanding and patriotism."

Governor Broughton added his approval of the Fair, commenting that "the esteem of the people of our State for this constructive type of exposition has been manifested in many ways".

"I commend this great institution to the people of North Carolina as worthy of their continued interest and support", Governor Broughton said.

Primary emphasis will be given agricultural, industrial and educational displays which will occupy nearly 100,000 square feet of exhibit space, but an ample entertainment program has been arranged including the World of Mirth Shows with 22 rides and 20 shows on the midway; nine outstanding grandstand acts and a revue; auto and harness races; fireworks each night and Lucky Teter and His Hell Drivers on October 15.

LAWS GOVERNING RETURNING MEN

(Continued from page 1.) Guard; and should they enlist in one of these services, they are not subject to call under the Selective Training and Service Act.

As to National Guardsmen, the Director explained, men given a discharge severing relations with all military organizations, if within the ages 21-36, are required to register under the Selective Training and Service Act and are subject to its requirements. But such discharged National Guardsmen are also privileged to enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps or in the National Guard.

On the other hand, he added, National Guardsmen not discharged, but relieved from active federal military service and returned as National Guardsmen to State control and State status, are not subject to registration or other requirements of the Selective Training and Service Act.

For the information of men interested in entering the Enlisted Reserve Corps, General Metts stated that the Commanding General of the Fourth Corps Area has designated the following officers at posts, camps and stations, all officers on duty with ROTC units, and all officers on duty in Military Area and Military District Headquarters of the Organized Reserves, to accept and enlist qualified applicants for the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

Men interested in enlistment in the National Guard, the Director added, may communicate with the Adjutant General's Department at Raleigh, and will be furnished the necessary enlistment blanks with instructions. Men so enlisted, he said, will become a part of the State Detachment.

BURNING PERMITS REQUIRED NOW

(Continued from page 1) tected area, between the first day of February and the first day of June, inclusive, or between the first day of October and the thirtieth day of November, inclusive, in any year, without first obtaining from the State Forester or one of his duly authorized agents a permit to set out fire or ignite any material in such above mentioned protected area; no charge shall be made for the granting of said permits.

"SECTION 2. This Act shall not apply to any fires started or caused to be started within five hundred feet of a dwelling house.

"SECTION 3. Any person, firm or corporation violating this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not more than fifty (50) dollars, or imprisoned for a period of not more than thirty (30) days.

"SECTION 4. All laws and clauses of laws in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed."

Rogers Cooper, white, pleaded guilty to charges of public drunkenness and was given 30 days on the roads. Judgment was suspended upon payment of costs and a fine of \$25.00. Of this amount \$15.00 was remitted.

Paul McDowell, white, was found guilty of gambling. His sentence of 30 days on the roads was suspended upon payment of costs and a fine of \$10.00.

M. F. Mason, white, was found
