LAWS GOVERNING RETURNING MEN

(Continued from page 1.) Guard; and should they enlist in one of these services, they are not subject to call under the Selective Training and Service

As to National Guardsmen, the Director explained, men given a discharge severing relations with all military organizations, if within the ages 21-36, are required to register under the Selective Training and Service Act and are subject to its requirements. But such discharged National Guardsmen are also previleged to enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps or in the National Guard.

On the other hand, he added, National Guardsmen not discharged, but relieved from active feder al military service and returned as National Guardsmen to State control and State status, are not subject to registration or other requirements of the Selective Training and Service Act.

For the information of men interested in entering the Enlisted Reserve Corps, General Metts stated that the Commanding General of the Fourth Corps Area has designated all recruiting of-


