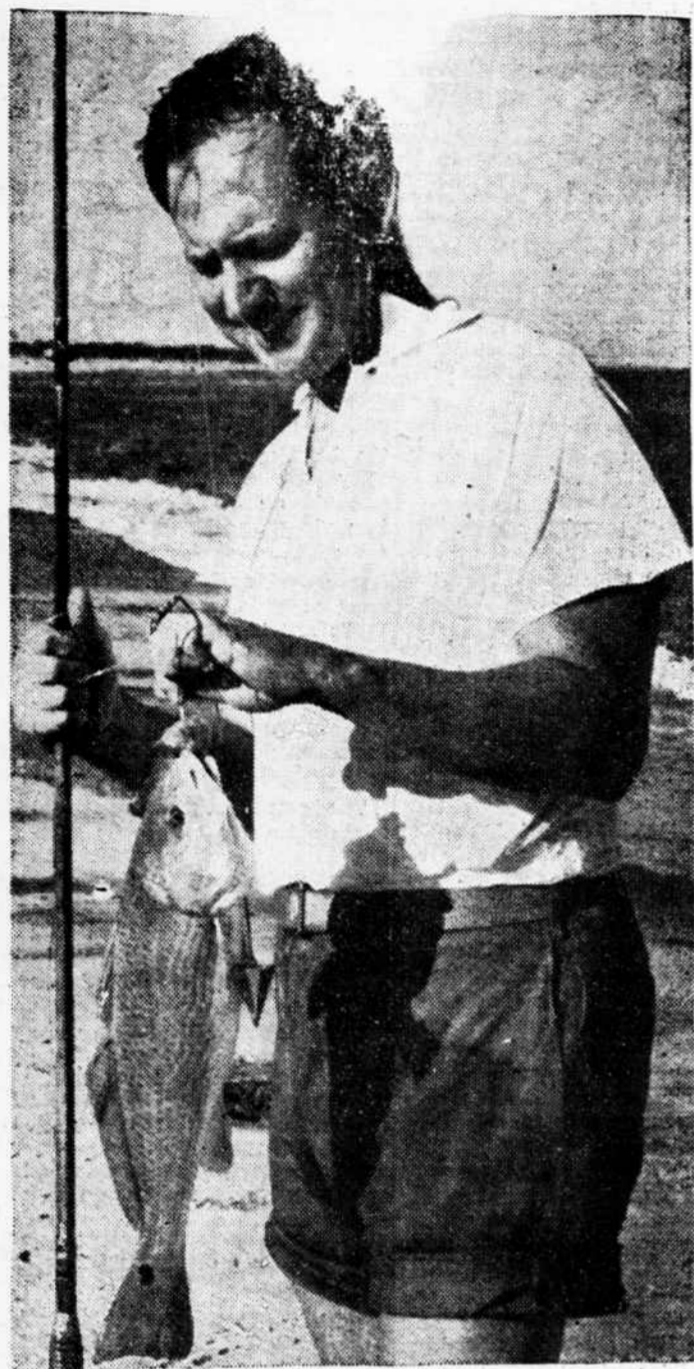


## FISHING PRIZE

Needless to say, there was a killing frost on both Monday and Tuesday.

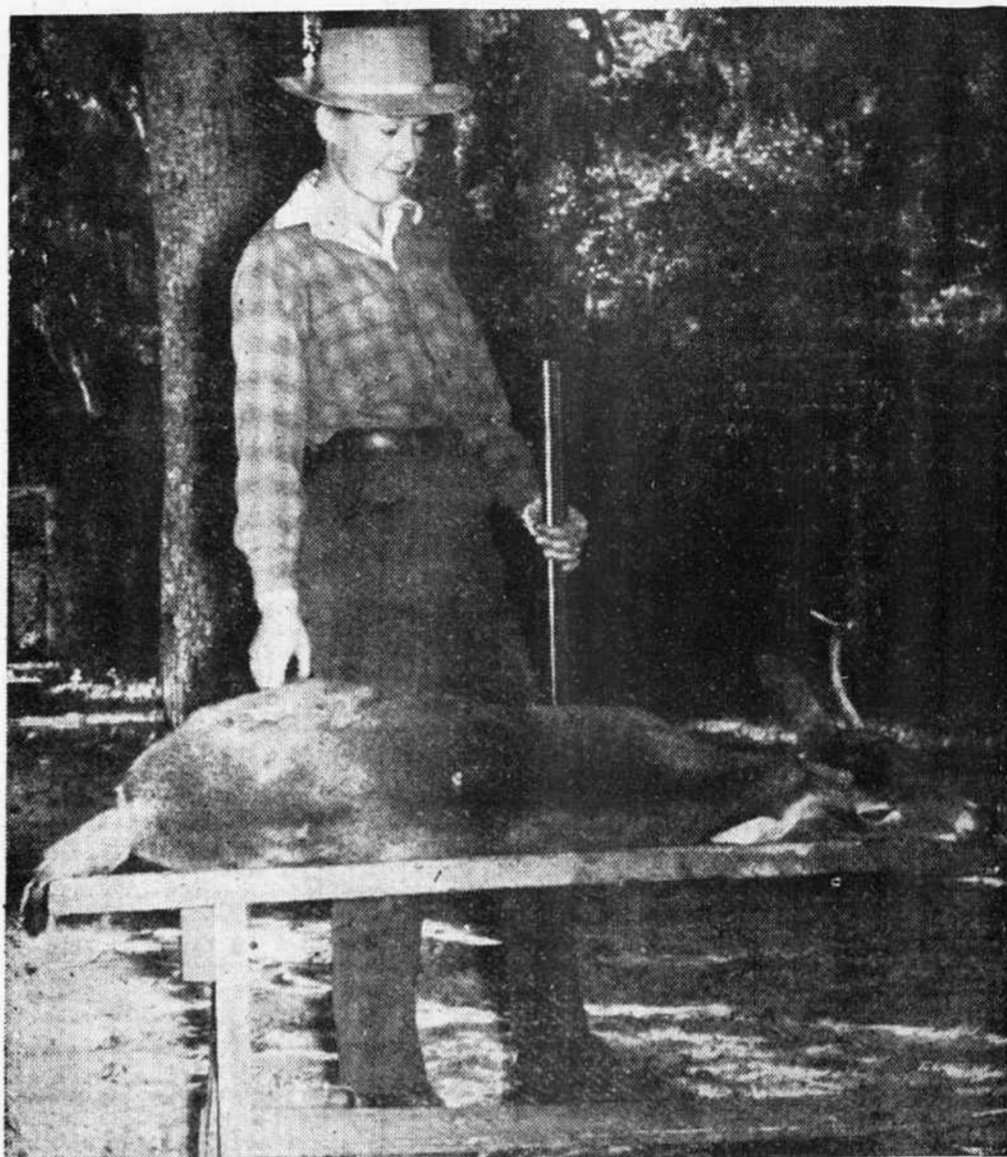
## Funeral Is Held For Mrs. Dozier

Will Ask State Highway Commission For Construction Of Modern Road And Bridge To Caswell

BELIEVED THAT WILL BE GRANTED

Preliminary Survey To Determine Practicability Of Route Made Sometime Ago

Navy authorities, Federal highway commission representatives and city of Southport representatives will meet with the State Highway Commission in Raleigh Friday to ask for the construction of a modern drawbridge across the inland waterway between Southport and Fort Caswell. The request also involves the re-routing of the present road. It is planned to have the bridge some 300 yards west of the Southport yacht basin, the road to leave highway 303 and 130 some five blocks up from the waterfront. It will strike the present Caswell road again just northwest of the Oak Island Coast Guard Station.

Indications are that the road and bridge may be built in the near future. The Brunswick County Chamber of Commerce made the first requests to the State Highway Commission for re-routing and building of a bridge where it would best serve the future. This request was made four months ago and the highway commission promptly surveyed the

## Issue Charter For Shipyard

Announcement Made Monday By Secretary of State Thad Eure; Developments Still Uncertain

Word was received Monday from Raleigh that a charter had been issued to Southport Shipyards, Inc., by Secretary of State Thad Eure.

Listed as incorporators were E. F. Middleton, of Southport, Louis Hanson of Wilmington and Robert M. Eaves of Washington, D. C. The charter authorizes the firm to issue \$100,000 in preferred stock and 6,000 shares of no par value stock.

From an unofficial source Tuesday it was learned that not too much importance is to be attached to the issuance of the charter. This is just a necessary step in the preparations for what is being sought as a development here. Plans still are in a formative stage.

## McMillan Makes Strong Appeal On Americanism

Commander Of State Department American Legion Delivered Inspiring Address At Seventh District Meeting

LOCAL POST WAS HOST TO VISITORS

Program And Dance Comprised One Of Most Impressive Programs In Post's History

An inspiring address by State Commander Robert L. McMillan featured the Seventh District American Legion banquet held Friday night with the local post hosts for this occasion. Choosing as his subject, "My Country", the state commander looked into the future for the picture of what is to be after the present world conflagration, to determine, if possible what will be the responsibility of the United States in the new world order. An international police force, the administration in the hands of the United States, China and some of the other American nations suggested a solution.

Commander McMillan quoted Einstein as saying that "This is the era of tragic distribution"; he quoted Dr. McDougald, famous philosopher, who says "We have learned the lessons of acquisition but we have not learned the lessons of distribution." These statements describe the cause for the present unrest, he thought, as he went deeper into the matter of reproduction and its effect upon conditions a few years ago. Responsibility of determining the cause of these troubles rests with the American people, he said, and particularly with the American Legion.

The speaker then chose to look at the soldier as a symbol of the nation's progress. "In pioneer days we see him facing westward for conquest. Later we see him at Concord Bridge, 'Firing his best heard round the world' in the battle of freedom. Tonight that battle is being fought for by Britain. May she be successful."

But our nation was not born in the days of the Revolution", declared the speaker. "Her birth was in the sad days of the 1860's, when brother fought against brother to determine for all times the strength of our Union and the future of the prospect of freedom."

There the speaker paid tribute to Robert E. Lee as perhaps the greatest soldier in the history of the world.

In the war with Spain the men of the North and the men of the South were back in arms, the time fighting side by side.

We find our soldiers always military, but never militaristic. Next we see our soldier on the threshold of the first World War, a soldier landed on foreign soil to fight a foreign foe. With a smile on his face, a song on his lips and steel in his eyes."

In talking about our soldiers the morale of our present army Commander McMillan advised that we be more concerned about our own morale. He advised that we first rid our hearts of greed and grasping, then let the boys know that what they are doing has the full support of our prayers and hopes. "These things will sustain him through his troubles and hardships and will help him live up to his high heritage," he said.

Recalling for the benefit of his listeners the symbolism of the stars of the American Flag, the state commander declared that there is room for only one "ism" in the United States, and that is Americanism. He praised the efficiency with which the American Legion has cooperated with all law enforcement agencies of the government to keep down crime, to search out spies and to minimize the influence of various subversive forces which seek to undermine this government. Declaring that next to Congress the American Legion is the most powerful organization in this nation, he declared that the United States should thank God for this organization.

Commander McMillan traced briefly the fight that the American Legion has waged through the years for an adequate national defense. "After branding us as 'war-mongers and flag-wavers', we are vindicated by the discovery that these ideas are the ideas of 129,000,000 citizens of our nation."

## Attachment Filed Against Caswell

Former Manager Has 30-Days In Which To File Complaint Showing Basis Of Claim For Large Payment

An attachment has been filed with Clerk of Court Sam T. Bennett against the Caswell-Carolina Corporation by H. H. Thomas to restrain the defendant from removing property from the State of North Carolina while, according to the paper, the defendant owes the plaintiff the sum of \$24,400.

It is alleged that this is for delinquent salary. The order allows 30-days for filing a complaint. Counsel for the plaintiff is John D. Bellamy of Wilmington.
