—PLATFORM—

- 1. We favor letting the people vote on the question of the removal of the County Seat to a more central location in Brunswick County. We cannot move the County Seat by act of the Legislature. We can pass a bill authorizing a vote by the people on the question. That is as far as we can go in the General Assembly, and that far only will we go.
- 2. Regardless of the location of the County Seat, we favor giving the County Welfare Board power and authority to locate its office at whatever place in the county it may deem most convenient and serviceable to the majority of the people of the county.
- 3. We favor the restoration to Justices of the Peace all of the powers and authority exercised by them under the Constitution and the laws of the State prior to the enactment of recent laws which were passed for the purpose of curtailing their powers and free speech, giving part of their work to the lawyers.
- 4. We favor a substantial reduction in taxes through the elimination of every office and every employee not absolutely essential to the efficient operation of the County Government, and through the reduction or readjustment of salaries upon a business-like basis: That every one receive pay commensurate with the services or work they actually perform, themselves, and not upon the basis of what they have somebody else to do.
- 5. We favor a further reduction in taxes through cutting down to a minimum the high cost of assessing, levying and collecting taxes.
- 6. We favor salaries and wages for all County Officers, appointees and employees commensurate with the work performed, but we are opposed to the payment of any amounts to any of them over and above the stipulated salaries or wages.
- 7. We favor the deposit of all fees collected by County Salaried officers in the County Depository to the Credit of the proper funds in which the said fees belong.
- 8. We favor the levying of fees uniformly on all people served by County Officials regardless of who they are, and we are opposed to the practice of excusing some from payment of legal fees for political purposes and collecting fees for similar services from all others, who are not kinsmen or political friends.
- 9. We pledge our unqualified support of the State Program of education, and we will exercise all of our powers in the General Assembly to bring every cent possible of the Public Schools Funds to Brunswick County.
- 10. We favor the construction and maintenance of principal and secondary roads under the present Highway System, but we favor a more equitable and justifiable distribution of State Road Funds and State Road Work to the several sections of Brunswick County.
- 11. We endorse the State Program of Public Health, and shall favor the enactment of all laws necessary to insure more adequate public health service to our people.
- 12. We endorse and approve all States Agencies, Departments, and Institutions that are set up and functioning for the general welfare of the people of the State, but we are opposed to many of the Commissions that are now in existence which we feel do not justify their existence and which we feel are an unnecessary burden upon the tax payers of the State, and we shall make an effort in the General Assembly to have some of them abolished.
- 13. We will not pass any laws or vote in favor of any laws affecting the farmers, the business men, the lumbermen, the fishermen or any other class of people until after we shall have consulted with them and learned their attitude toward the proposed laws.
- 14. We favor adequate and efficient and economical management and control of all public service activities in Brunswick County including the Welfare Department, the County Jail, the County Farm Agent's Department and the County Hospital.
