

Navy Recruiter Here Tomorrow

A representative from the Naval Recruiting Station at Wilmington will be in Southport all day Thursday, June 25, and men who face possible Army duty in the near future are advised to investigate the new opportunities being offered by the Naval Reserve.

The rapidly-expanding United States Navy needs men badly now for important posts, and many ratings are open to qualified men. Under the new setup authorized last week, it is possible for men to enter the service with good salaries, and with good duty.

The representative is Jesse A. Helms, First Class Petty Officer.

USNR, who will have ready all information for men and boys who are interested in Naval service, and the opportunities which it offers.

Today, as never before, the Navy has thrown its trade schools open wide, and boys who have a fair education and good intelligence are given every chance to learn a trade, and thereby become a petty officer within three months after entering the service.

For men qualified in construction, there also is a fine service open — and with ratings open up to chief petty officers. Pay runs up to \$126 per month.

Helms, who will be stationed at the postoffice in Southport on Thursday, pointed out that men who have received induction orders for the Army still may enlist in the Navy — if their induction date still is three days or more off. Misunderstanding has caused many men to go to the Army, when they still had chances of entering the Navy, and Helms emphasized the fact that Army induction orders do not prohibit a man from enlisting into the Naval Service.

Married men, the recruiter said, need not hold back for fear that their wives will go uncared for. Also, it was pointed out, immediate reclassification of married men for Army duty is underway, and those men, particularly, would be wise to investigate their chances in the Navy.

Revenue Collector and secure a \$5.00 use tax stamp and affix it to his vehicle on or before July 1, 1942. Collector Robertson said. The various postoffices will sell the stamps over the counter for cash only and no mail order business with respect thereto will be conducted by the postoffices. Collectors of Internal Revenue are authorized to accept cash, post-office money orders, and certified checks in payment of the use tax stamp. However, as revenue stamps have an intrinsic value, uncertified checks will not be acceptable in payment thereof.

It is the desire of the Bureau of Internal Revenue that the use tax stamp shall be placed on the windshield in a location that will not be in conflict with State requirements.

one of our own planes, that does not make it a 'fake tip' or a 'phony alarm'. The warning is still real, urgent, and in the exercise of discipline that an aroused and alert people should have, it means that certain prearranged, prescribed steps must be taken. They should be taken without question and without discussion because they affect the common good, the defense of the entire community.

If it is an enemy formation that has been located, it may be very far from our shores. We do not know in which direction it will turn. It may head north, or it may head south, ignoring what seemed to be the original target. If we are mistaken, if we guess wrong, the warning will quickly be followed by an "All Clear."

Major Tigner presents this explanation in the hope that it will enable the people to understand why there may be many warnings. Berlin had three the first day of war; London had twelve.

They are warnings that something may happen. They are not promises. Every citizen has a patriotic duty, for himself and his country, to carry out orders that are the result of these warnings, no matter how many there are, no matter if he never sees an enemy plane. For all, seeing no enemy plane is the best break he can get.
