

Boats For Sale By Government

Many Offshore Patrol Many Offshore Patrol For Sale As Surplus Property At Coast Guard Base At Bucksport

About sixty boats, including some that were yachts the majority commercial fishing boats before the government took them over at the start of the war, are now being advertised for sale as surplus property. Bids will be received through February 27th.

The boats are at the Coast Guard base at Bucksport, S. C., and may be inspected by prospective bidders. Specifications and provisions under which the sales will be made are also available.

Practically all of these boats are said to be suitable for shrimping and fishing. The average length is around 50 feet or more. Some are new boats, having been turned out by shipyards during the last three or four years. All have good engines and equipment and are understood to be ready for immediate service.

While most of them are of the large shrimp boat type, a number were built as pleasure yachts and private boats. Quite a number of Brunswick county fishermen are said to have inspected the craft at Bucksport and there may be several bidders from this county.
