He also plans to buy a Hereford bull so that eventually he will be able to market a few baby beefs each year. Mr. Smith is very interest- ed in livestock and usually sells enough hogs each year to make his annual payment on his farm.

Warehouse Has Floor Space Of 59,000 Feet And Was Built In 1935; One Of Finest In Belt

CUTTS BACK AGAIN AS AUCTIONEER

Willard Huggins Floor Manager; Personnel Is About The Same As Last Season

Ushering in the 1944 tobacco season with the lusty chant of tobacco auctioneer, Sid Cutts, proprietors, A. H. (Bert) Moore and L. R. Jackson will launch Whiteville's newest and most modern warehouse, Farmers Warehouse for another season.

Farmers, built in 1935, af- fords the growers with 59,000 square feet of floor space on which to place their tobacco. It is considered one of the finest houses in the belt.

Teaming again this year to operate the warehouse, Messrs. Moore and Jackson boast a com- bined experience in the leaf in- dustry of over 50 years. Both are known to the people of Columbus

County as men of out-standing ability in the tobacco realm.

Mr. Moore is beginning his 16th year on the Whiteville mar- ket, his 27th in the game, with a steadily growing reputation that any warehousemen should be proud of. He operates the Planter's Warehouse in Hender- son, N. C., and at one time was proprietor of the Star Warehouse (now Brooks) here with Motley Bros. operating.

Mr. Jackson has been in the business in Columbus County for 20 years, operating a warehouse in Chadbourne for five years be- fore coming to the local market. He has chalked up a record for 27 years in the tobacco industry.

The personnel of the Farmers warehouse will be about the same this year as last. Beginning his 28th year as tobacco auctioneer Sid Cutts, will be back to begin his fifth year on the Whiteville market. Mr. Cutts began chant- ing 17 years ago and has in- creased in ability with each pass- ing season.

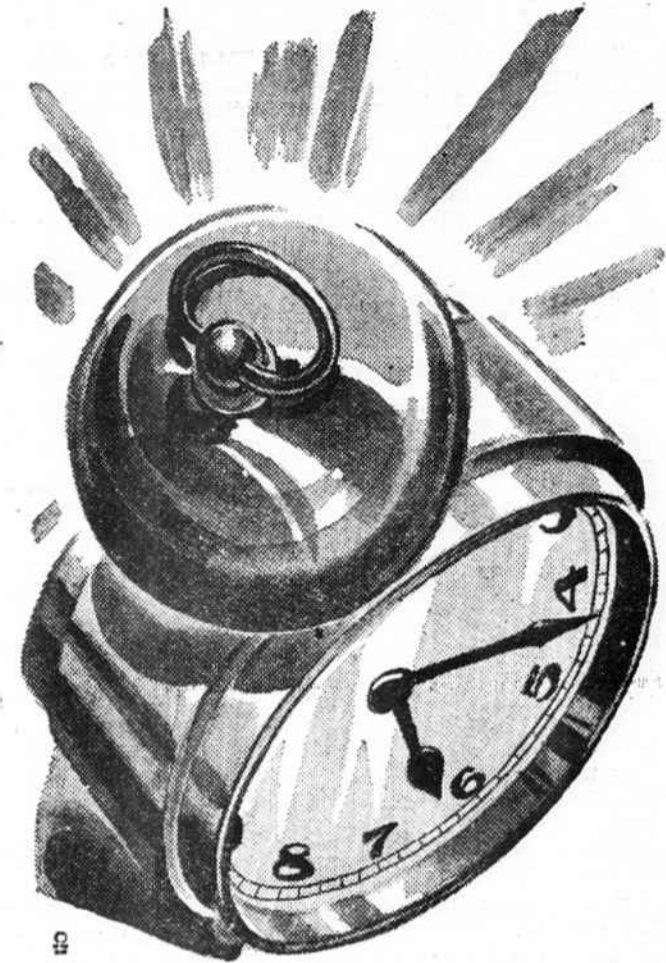
