Members of the Brunswick County Grand Jury completed their deliberations on Tuesday and submitted the following brief

report of their actions: "Superior Court, May Term 1948. "State of North Carolina "County of Brunswick "To The Honorable John J. Burney, Judge Presiding: "The Grand Jury was in session for two days, completing all business on Tuesday, May 18, 1948.

"We have checked the following-named magistrates and find their accounts in proper form: Coy Duval, Elliott Tripp, M. L. Galloway, Mayor of Shallotte, C. O. Blanton, A. W. Smith, H. Foster Mintz, G. F. Gainey, A. H. Gainey.

"We have also inspected the office of the Clerk of Superior Court and found everything in order. "We find the Register of Deeds office in good order and recommended that the room needs painting. "We also visited the county jail and found it in good order with most of the former recommendations being complied with.

Long Prison Terms Given (Continued from page one) and was placed on good behavior for 2 years.

Charlie Robbins pleaded nolo contendere to charges of larceny from the person and possession of intoxicating beverages for the purpose of sale. Sentences totaling 3 years on the roads were suspended upon condition that the defendant pay the costs, serve 5 years on probation, make restitution in the amount of \$650.00 to C. H. Smith, prosecuting witness, have his place of business padlocked for 12 months. The costs are to be paid at the rate of \$30.00 monthly to the clerk of court.

Robert Johnson was convicted of drunk driving and was given 12 months on the roads, judgment suspended upon payment of costs and the amount of \$305.00 to W. S. Wells, prosecuting witness. His driving license was revoked for 12 months.

In the case charging Sidney Hewett with assault there was a directed verdict of not guilty.

B. W. Simmons was found guilty of possession of intoxicating beverage for the purpose of sale and given 12 months on the roads, judgment being suspended upon payment of costs and fine of \$50.00.

Ellis Dudley was given 18 months and Moses Moore 12 months upon conviction on charges of possession and transporting intoxicating liquor. A bench warrant was issued by Judge Burney for James Dudley, whose automobile also was ordered confiscated.

The following cases were continued: Liston Babson, false pretense; Roney, Carlisle, larceny; Victor Lewis, larceny by trick; Ewell Cape Maddern, drunk driving; Tobias Simmons, false pretense; Willie Belton, damage to property; K. Hewett, assault and resisting arrest; James Johnson, possession and transporting; LeRoy McLamb, larceny and receiving; Dora Gore, violating stock law.

Capias issued in the following cases: James Herring, drunk

driving and reckless operation, improper lights and no license tag; Willie Fulwood, reckless operation; Winnie Paschall, possession.

The following cases were not pressed: Barney Stanley, interfering with an officer in performance of his duty; Edouard Hulbert, receiving stolen goods; Lynwood Harvell, reckless operation; James McDaniel, murder; C. T. Jarman, drunk driving; An-

son Nelson and Lydia McDaniel, fornication and adultery; L. Wilder, reckless operation; Charges against Hilda Williams were dropped due to death. Thomas M. Perimeter had a bond of \$200.00 in his charging him with drunk driving in the matter of Corn vs. Corn. Divorce decrees were granted in the matter of Hart vs. Hart and Kinston.

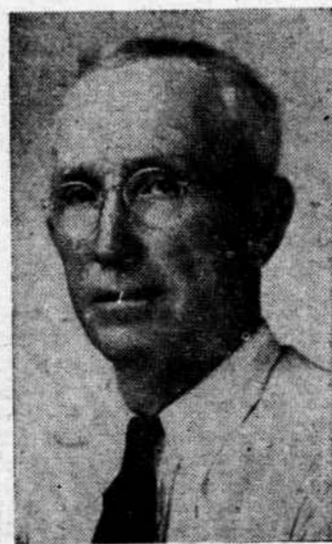
