Making our usual Saturday afternoon trip up from the beach to catch a bus at Supply were riding in a jeep with half a dozen young folks. It was comfortable enough there in the front seat, but with some question of whether we would be in time for the bus, we noticed the girls in the back seat flopping up and down like a pair of bullfrog legs in a hot skillet.

Although Dr. Landis Brown did not tell us exactly what was the matter—a policy in which he was backed up by Dr. F. M. Burdette, Mrs. Dan Shannon and about all of the nurses and their aids—we found ourselves in a private room in Doshier Memorial Hospital early Sunday morning. We remained there until we walked out, rather weakly late Monday afternoon. We suppose that we were put in the neighborhood of the maternity ward because we could not hear the new arrivals voicing their greetings to the world. Anyway, we were wheeled in there and had not been in our room more than ten minutes before Mrs. W. C. Norton further up the hall sent in a note to say she had a new eight pound son. His yelling, if he did yell, did not disturb us. Neither did that

of the rest of the new arrivals. The thing we were most conscious of, aside of the pains in our abdominal region, was that Dr. Brown, Dr. Burdette, all of the nurses and two orderlies were awfully kind. Some of them were in to see us every minute or two, likewise a lot of friends. Dr. H. B. Johnson, Morivan minister of Winston-Salem, came in and held a sort of sunrise service over us in the afternoon. He was accompanied by Mrs. Johnson and Dr. Thor Johnson. This is the first thing we are writing after getting back to the office, where Dr. Brown told us we had no business being. Naturally, we are still sort of hazy and have no clear recollection of everybody who came around. One thing is sure, we appreciate all of the attention we received from the hospital folks and everybody else.
