1937 was 59 cents per day, but

in 1947 it had reached \$2.38, an increase of 300 per cent. Since none of these hospitals have any source of income other than that collected for patient care, their ability to continue in operation in face of mounting costs has been due largely to funds from government sources. In 1937 the hospitals were donating 29.3 per cent of the cost of free hospitalization, but in 1947 they were donating only 3.6 per cent, indicating that state and local government units have assumed the major share of free hospitalization.

Back in 1937 and continuing largely through 1942, hospitals were forced to charge enough from those able to pay their bills in order to be able to absorb the burden of free hospitalization of indigents, Mr. Laycock said. "Free hospitalization" is a myth, Laycock added. Someone has to pay for it. If the state or some other agency doesn't pay it, then the hospitals must obtain the money for charity patients from those patients who do their bills.
