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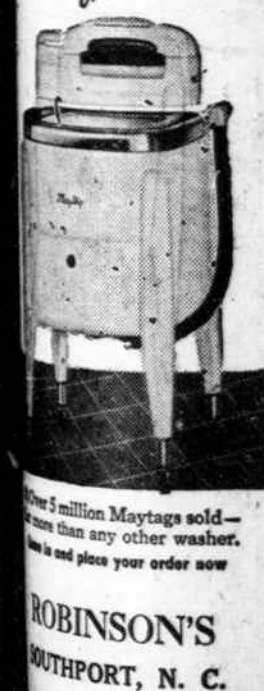

John M. Barkley, general chairman of the Farmers Day committee, announced that the parade would be staged at the morning hour and that the program would continue without intermission except for dinner and supper hours. Arrangements have been made for the county's school children

to have a half-holiday and join the festivities. A stage will be erected this week on the Railroad Plaza and this will be the scene of the entertainment features which will be presented. A band concert, under the direction of County Bandmaster Bob Hodges, will follow the parade. A Farmers' Court, miscellaneous contests and music by Slim Mims and his Dream Ranch Boys will be sandwiched in between two performances by Wallace, the Magician. Wallace will appear first at 2 o'clock and return for another show at 5 o'clock.

Something new for Farmers Day is on the calendar for 7 p. m. Jim Crockett, noted promoter of professional wrestling matches, will bring a quartet of his grunt and groan boys here to do their chores. The two matches will be staged on the Railroad Plaza platform.
