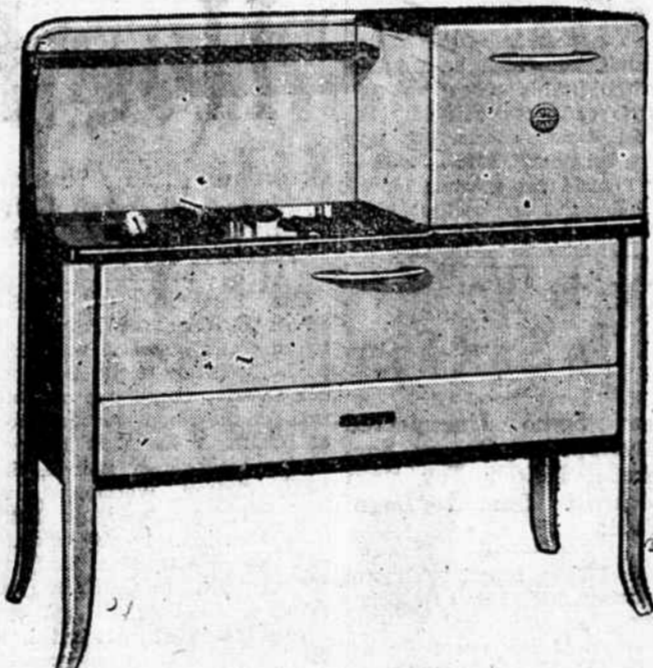

Inspection Lane Arrives For Its Only Visit During Month

Motor Vehicle Inspection Lane No. 35 set up in Whiteville today for its only Columbus County visit in November. Paul Avant of Chadbourn, supervisor of the lane, announced this morning that inspection would begin tomorrow morning and continue through Thursday of next week, Nov. 11.

Owners of models on which inspection is required this month must go through the lane during the next 10 days or drive to Salisbury or Lumberton for the inspections. The inspection lane will return to the county only once more this year and that will be on Dec. 1.
