June In January For 4-H Families

Fruits And Vegetables Canned By Club Girls To Be On Many Tables Next Winter

It'll be June in January for North Carolina 4-H families when it comes to eating fruits and vegetables next winter. Girls enrolled in the 1949 National 4-H Canning Achievement awards program have learned to estimate family food needs, and have the food preservation plans pretty well worked out. They are doing a lot to top last year's national output of 17 million quarts canned by 4-H Club girls.

In addition to providing healthful, nutritious dishes for daily meals, the canning project cuts food costs considerably. Most of the produce, meat and poultry canned is raised on the home farm. The girls are aware of the importance of fruits and vegetables in the winter diet and see to it that there's a plentiful variety served at the family table. To exhibit prize jars of sparkling jellies, cool green pickles and bright colored vegetables is the ambition of every girl.

Records are kept of amount, kind and value of canned products, giving North Carolina 4-H'ers an opportunity of quality for merit awards provided by the Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation.

Mary Alice Kerr of Castle Haynes was the 1948 state champion, winning a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. There were 64 North Carolina County medal winners. Besides these, six \$300 scholarships are awarded to a national group selected from the state champions. The Cooperative Extension Service vice supervises the activity.
