### WHEN PIE HUNTERS FALL OUT.

Both Spencer Adams and Marion Butler Want Republican Nomination for Senator.

There's a saying that follows of a certain sort—is it pie-eaters—fall out, folks of another sort get their dues. According to Editor Hildebrand, of the Asheville Gazette, who wires his paper from Washington, there's a storm brewing between Butler and Adams. He wires:

"It is said that strained relations now exist between Former Senator Marion Butler and Judge Spencer B. Adams, chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee. The Legislature is to meet very soon, and according to a story going the rounds here, both the Republican Chairman and the political adventurer, Butler would like to have the Republican caucus nomination for Senator.

"Before the last election Mr. Butler was head to say that he expected to be in the Senate again in less than ten years. A complimentary vote, such as Butler desires, would be a step in that direction, albeit it might appear a very short step, considering the size of the Democratic majority which has been turned out since Butler and Adams assumed direction of the affairs of their party.

"Several members of the Legislature say they do not propose to vote for either one of these two, and are looking for some other candidate on whom to bestow the honor."
