Hotel Building Being Erected For Offices, New Store, Etc.—Bank Seeking New Quarters—Satisfied With Local Telephone Service.

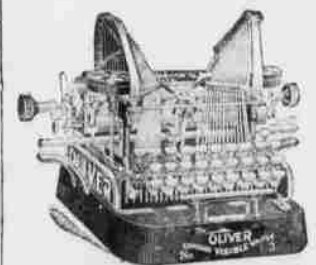

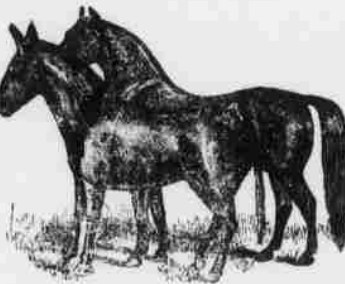
