BEST OF REUNIONS.

Attendance of Confederate Veterans at Richmond.

HUNDREDS OF 'JOHNNY REBS. PRESENT.

All General Officers Re-Elected—Thanks Congress and President for Battle Flags and Appropriation—Little Incidents.

Wednesday of last week the city of Richmond was profusely decorated in honor of the Annual Reunion of the Confederate Veterans. The attendance was the largest ever, and the city honored itself by taking care that every one enjoyed the season.

The Randolph delegation has returned declaring its delight that the Randolph camp was organized in this reunion of the soldiers of the once powerful army whose ranks are now rapidly thinning.

North Carolina had the largest delegation of any of the States and was honored with first place in the procession.

Each day of the session was crowded with events interesting and entertaining, consisting of memorial services, concerts, etc., and the business meetings of the veterans were marked by enthusiasm.

The next reunion will be held at Birmingham, Ala. The general officers with Gen. Stephen D. Lee, as commander, were re-elected. Resolutions were adopted as follows:

To endow a confederate hospital at the home formerly owned by Stonewall Jackson, at Lexington Va.

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of the birth of Gen. Lee by a permanent memorial in the Washington and Lee University, of which he was President.

Extending a vote of thanks to the President and to Congress for the return of the confederate flags captured and for the appropriation of \$200,000 to care for the graves of veterans buried in Northern soil.

A cane cut from the center of Gold Harbor battlefield, where 14,500 were killed June 3, 1864, in thirty minutes, was presented by J. J. Estes, Company D, Eighth Virginia Cavalry to General Stephen D. Lee. The commander accepted the gift in fitting language.
