The body of Roberta Spears, one of the party of five negroes drowned in the Yadkin river near Spencer last November was washed ashore last week.

The N. & W. Railway has begun improvements on the depot and yard at Winston-Salem which when completed will have cost \$100,000.

The employees of the cotton mills at A. B. Harris enjoyed the annual outing last Saturday. Col. J. S. Cunningham, of Roxboro, and Messrs. J. M. Manpin and W. Thos. Best, of Salisbury, delivered addresses.

At a motor race in London Friday some of the machines made 90 miles an hour in contesting for prizes worth \$23,500.

Will Fesperman, a Rowan county man attempted a public exhibition at Salisbury July 4th, trying to stand on his head on a pole 40 feet high. He lost his balance and fell to the ground, landing on his head. His condition is desperate.

The board of directors of the Jamestown Exposition Tuesday night formally placed Mr. James M. Barr at the head of the Exposition, and the stockholders authorized a second mortgage for about \$325,000, to set the Exposition on its feet.

Lexington and Coolemees played an interesting game of ball at Lexington Saturday which resulted in a victory for Lexington by a score of 11 to 1.

Capt. Samuel H. McRae, a leading lawyer of Fayetteville, died at a hospital in Baltimore Saturday. Capt. McRae was 39 years old and was referee in bankruptcy at the time of his death.

J. B. Myrick, native of Chatham county, member of Co. E., 44th N. C. Infantry, U. C. V., died at the Confederate Veteran's home at Raleigh last week. He was 87 years old.

Kinney et al vs Anderson Moser et al, I shall sell on the premises, at public auction, to the highest bidder for cash, on the 29th day of July 1907, at 12 o'clock M., the following described tract of land, lying and being in the county of Randolph, and State of North Carolina on the waters of Sandy Creek adjoining the lands of Thomas York Wm. Staley, Jesse Julian, R. W. Jones, Citha Pugh and others, and bounded as follows:
