The Secretary of State shipped copies of the laws of 1907 to the several thousand magistrates in the State last week. Eleven persons were killed and a dozen injured in a wreck at Waterloo, Iowa, last Friday. Eight of the dead bodies could not be identified. Rev. E. G. Kilgore, of Pleasant Garden, is assisting Rev. Masters and Cecil Mills, aged 8 and 9 years, left Salisbury alone last Friday for Indian Territory, a distance of 1500 miles to join their father. They are grandchildren of Mr. Jno. Doyle, of Salisbury. The general offices of the Seaboard Air Line will be moved from Portsmouth, Va., to Atlanta, Ga., within a year. The reason for the removal is that Atlanta is geographically the centre of the entire system. Wm. Macintosh, a negro who fought at San Juan Hill Cuba in 1898, was hanged at Norfolk for murder last Thursday. R. P. McAnally, of Stokes, who made charges against Senator J. C. Buxton, of being improperly influenced in the last Legislature, has retracted every statement in the article which appeared in the Danbury Reporter, signed "David." Wm. Drinkard, manager of the local branch of the Virginia Brewing Co. at Winston, has absconded. He is short in his accounts about \$900. He had been in charge of the branch about three years.
