Rev. S. B. Turrentine, for the Committee on Orphanage, recom-mended that the Conference estab-lish an orphanage this year, and an inter-sting discussion was followed by an adoption of the report.

The orphanage now seems assured for this year and the location was left with a board of trustees yet to be appointed. Several towns in the State are aircady at work to secure the instruction. This was the most important act of the conference Thursday.
