JUSTICE BREWER CRITICISES THE PRESIDENT.

Justice Brewer, of the United States Supreme Court, in an address in New York last week, on public office in relation to public opinion, surprised his audience by engaging in a red-hot criticism of President Roosevelt. We quote from the address as follows:

"In this country we elect political officers generally for short and specific terms. For the term elected, ruling, of course, in accordance with constitutional provisions, the one selected is a ruler. He may be impulsive, enthusiastic, strenuous, exhibiting a spectacular and dramatic life, or calm and self-poised in administration. No one doubts that President Roosevelt or Governor Hughes is a ruler. Neither one is absolute. Each is subject to limitation. The range of his power is prescribed, yet within that range each is most emphatically a ruler.

"The president is the chief magistrate of this nation, not for his glory, but for our good. Indeed, his greatest glory should be in accomplishing the most for our welfare.

"It may not be generally known that the convention that framed the constitution at first prescribed a presidential term of seven years with a prohibition on re-election. In the judgment of some men, among whom I am one, there is a mistake in changing the seven year term, with prohibition on re-election to the present four year term. In the light of history I think it would have been better to have left the presidential term seven years. If that were the provision, we should not now have the spectacle of a strenuous president playing a game of hide and seek with the American people."

"It is disgraceful for him to adopt the politicians' trick of being for the law, but against its enforcement."

Justice Brewer then passed to the consideration of the conduct of judges and said:

"God pity the republic when our judges introduce the spectacular in their judicial proceedings for the sake of temporary popular applause."

He quoted Lord Mansfield as saying:

"I wish popularity, but not that which is run after; it is that popularity which sooner or later never fails to do justice to the pursuit of noble ends by noble minds."

Congress Busy With President's Message.

The Sixth Congress convened at Washington Monday.

Neither the House nor the Senate have settled the business as yet. The time so far been practically consumed by the reading of the President's message. It was presented to both houses Tuesday.

In his message President Roosevelt touched upon the great resources of the country.

He urged careful and cautious legislation to remove as far as possible the causes of suffering among our people, and to assert the sovereignty of the National Government. He advised Federal activity in the control of interstate commerce, declaring that as a rule the attempts of the state's control in its borders as far as possible has been either too lax, or too drastic.

He urges stricter control of railroads by Federal law and exactions.

He advises a revision of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law to suit the conditions today and to make it more efficient, giving the Federal Government control over the big business concerns.

The President asks close co-operation with the states in administering the pure food laws.

Prompt attention to the currency question is urged and opposition to "finkering with the tariff" before an election" is also expressed in his message.

Other matters discussed in the message were: State's rights, in matters of Federal injunctions; compulsory investigation of industrial disputes; conflict of capital and labor; Appalachian Park; Panama Canal; Postal affairs; the army, etc.

Federal court convenes at Raleigh December 10th. There are 260 cases on the docket, and of these 225 are for illicit distilling.

Rich gold ore has been found in the heart of Spencer where the Southern Railway Co. is sinking an artesian well.

The attending physicians announced Sunday that Mrs. Louise M. Taft, mother of Secretary of State Taft, is slowly sinking. They have abandoned hope of her recovery.

The Wright Safety Air Brake Co. was organized at Greensboro Saturday. The company will manufacture and place the John B. Wright device for prevention of railroad car derailment on the market at once.

Miss Edith Root, daughter of Secretary of State Elihu Root, and Lieut. U. S. Grant, a grandson of Gen. U. S. Grant were married at Washington Wednesday afternoon.

Fire was discovered in the Winston Hotel at Winston-Salem last Wednesday which did damage to the extent of \$11,000 to the hotel and stock of the Messick Grocery Co., who conduct a wholesale business in the building.

SECRET WRITING.

How Letters May Be Made Safe From Prying Eyes.

Even with the most unromantic of us occasions sometimes arise when we should like to make some memorandum or write some letter which cannot be read except by those we wish to do so. Here is a simple method:

Soak a sheet of note paper in cold water and lay it perfectly flat upon a pane of glass. Place above it another sheet, dry this time, and on the upper sheet write your message with a fairly hard pencil. You now destroy the dry paper and allow all the moisture to evaporate from the wet piece. Don't hold it to the fire, but let it dry naturally. If you then examine it closely you will see not the faintest trace of writing, but if you moisten the paper once more and hold it up to the light you can read quite plainly all you wrote. It will show up like the watermark on a postage stamp. This method, by the way, is sometimes adopted by convicts. They use their gruel cans instead of glass and a sharp piece of wood for a pencil.

Another way is less dirty and even more effective. Lay several sheets of paper on a flat surface and write upon the top one. Then remove the bottom sheet, on which no impression appears. If you hold this in the vapor of iodine, however, the writing will turn brown and be quite legible. The explanation is plain. The note paper contains starch, which on being pressed turns to hydramide, a substance which is acted on by iodine in the manner described.—Answers.

THE PURSER'S JOKE.

Why Religious Services Were Not Held on That Trip.

On most of the big ocean steamers a minister is usually found among the passengers, and invariably he is called upon on Sunday to conduct religious service in the main dining saloon. Occasionally the man of the cloth seeks the purser and asks if he may conduct a service on the Sabbath. A case of this sort happened recently on one of the Red D steamers on the run from New York to La Guayra. A young minister who three days before the steamer sailed had taken orders from a seminary, and a day later a wife asked the purser if he might conduct religious service on the following day, which was Sunday. The purser replied that the dining saloon was at his disposal and that the passengers would be informed. "At what hour shall the service begin?" asked the young minister. The purser rubbed his brow a moment and replied that he could begin at "nine bells." On the following day he listened again for "nine bells," but heard them not.—New York Tribune.

Care of Horses.

If your horse continually stumbles, don't whip him, but take him to a farrier who knows his business. Most cases of stumbling are due to improper shoeing.

Horses more than three years old should have their teeth examined frequently. Sore mouth is often caused by jagged teeth which need the application of a file.

If your horse lolls his tongue out of the side of his mouth, sell him if you can. Doubtful if he can be cured of the habit.

Let your horse know that you are his master, but it is not necessary to acquaint him with this knowledge by the use of a club.

Never enter a horse's stall without speaking. We have known men to have the breath kicked out of them through failure to observe this precaution.

Teach your horse to raise his foot instantly at the word and the touch.
