Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Collett were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Sapp recently.

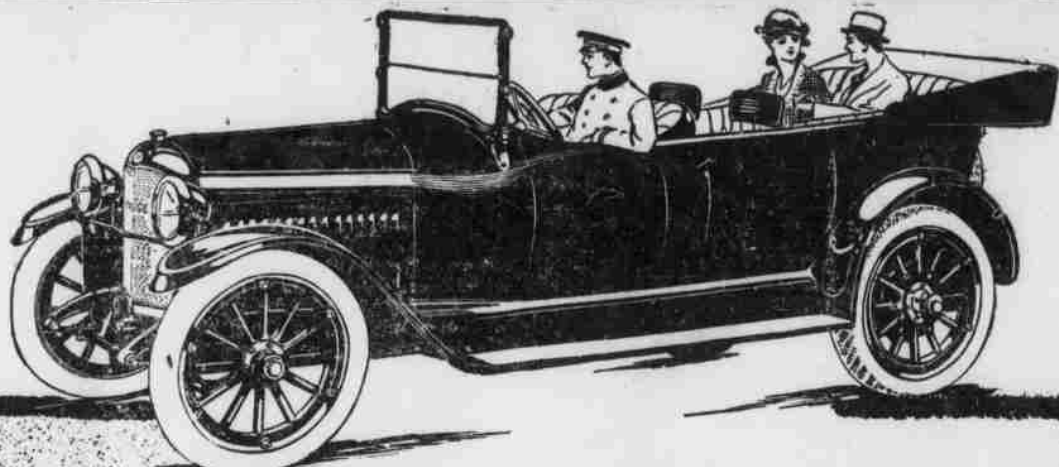
Miss Birdie Royals is spending some time with her brother, Lee Royals.
