The principal contention of this latest German note seems to be an effort to place the blame for loss of lives on the Lusitania on England, it being claimed the British Government repuidated all rules of international law and disregarded all rights of neutrals by declaring the North Sea a war area, planting mines, stopping and capturing vessels, thus paralyzing peaceable traffic between Germany and neautral countries and forcing the Imperial German Government to retaliate.
