The greatest wheat crop in history was raised this year. The yield is unprecedented, and will cause disup-pointment to a horde of speculators who would greatly profit by reason of the war.

The total world crop of 1915 wheat is now estimated by American and English agricultural officials at 518.-500,000 quarters, which equals 248.-Flat Creek Supply Co. mdse 000,000,000 pounds or 129,625,000 tons, az against 456,500,000 quarters A marter is 480 pounds.
