**RALPH H. GRAVES PROMOTED**

Ralph H. Graves former assistant to the managing editor of the New York Times has been promoted to the position of city editor of that paper. Mr. Graves is the son of the late Ralph Graves, Sr., of Chapel Hill and a nephew of Dr. Graves who formerly lived at Trinity. He is also a relative of Mr. Tom Graves who lives near Shiloh.

The Printer and Publisher in its current issue has this to say:

"Ralph H. Graves, assistant to the managing editor of the New York Times, has been appointed city editor of that newspaper in succession to the late Arthur Greaves.

Mr. Graves was born at Chapel Hill, N. C., on July 11, 1878, and was educated at the University of North Carolina, where he took the degree of bachelor of arts in 1907, and the master's degree the following year. Coming to New York he joined the staff of the Times in June 1899, serving until December 1904, when he went to the Evening Post as reporter.

The manner in which Mr. Graves covered the Hughes insurance investigation made a reputation for him among newspaper men, and he returned to the Times in July, 1906, serving as assistant editor until February 1907. Then he accepted the position of assistant city editor of the Evening Post, later becoming city editor, a post that held him for a short time before he returned to the Times in 1912.

**ARBOR AND BIRD DAY NOVEMBER 5.**

Governor Locke Craig Issues Proclamation Calling for General Observance.

County Superintendent T. Fletcher Bulla has received leaflets issued by State Superintendent Joyner containing matter for the observance of Arbor and Bird Day in North Carolina. The manual is compiled for the use of teachers in arranging their programs for the exercises by the pupils on that day. Under the proclamation of Governor Craig, Friday, November 5, is set apart for general observance. The proclamation follows:

**Proclamation by Governor**

Whereas, nearly two-thirds of the total area of North Carolina is now covered by forest growth, the greater part of which has been cut over to lumberman and devastated by fire to such an extent that its annual yield is less than one-half what it should be; and

Whereas, the soil is the material source of our strength and upon its right use depends the permanent prosperity of our State; and

Whereas, the coming generation is coming to realize that the use of the forests and the soil has not been in accordance with proper economy inasmuch as forests have been destroyed by axe and fire, steep lands have been cleared and unwisely used and ruinously cultivated; and

Whereas, the coming generation of forests and soil users is now in our public schools; and upon the school children of the state is to fall the task of repairing the loss caused by our carelessness or indifference; and

Whereas the General Assembly of this state has seen fit to enact an Arbor Day law;

Now, therefore, I, Locke Craig, governor of the state of North Carolina, realizing the value which the suitable observance of this day will be to the State in interesting the rising generation in a proper appreciation of our forests, our birds, our trees and our shrubs, do hereby proclaim that Friday, the fifth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, shall be appropriately observed as Arbor Day by the teachers and children of all the public schools of the state by recitations, drills, songs and exercises appropriate to the occasion and by the planting of trees and shrubs on the school grounds.

Let this be done that the purpose of Arbor Day may be imbued upon us and upon the youth and interest awakened in a subject the consideration of which will add to our general prosperity and the future wealth of North Carolina, and will greatly add to the happiness of us and our children.

Done at our city of Raleigh, this thirteenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and in the one hundred and fortieth year of our American independence.
