FIRST TORRENS LAND TITLE IN THIS COUNTY

In the Superior court of Guilford county November 8 Judge Thomas J. Shaw signed the final papers in the first state guaranteed land title re-corded in this county, under what is known as the Torrens title law enacted by the legislature of 1913. The

owner of the property is John W. Hicks, of Goldsboro, and it consists of something more than an acre of land near the State Normal College and is assessed for taxation at a valuation of \$2,420. The whole proceeding was completed in just three months.
