Senator Ben Tillman, of South Carolina, in a speech in the Senate Monday came to the defense of Secretary Daniels and his navy program. According to the Senator an adequate navy is one imperative necessity for American national life and honor and to uphold the Monroe doctrine.

One of the most important features of school work is the improvement of the school houses and grounds. Too often this is neglected and the material improvements of the public schools are not what they should be. A good portion of the life of the child each year is spent in school and if for no other reason than to promote cleanliness and industry among the pupils the school house and grounds should be kept clean and neat. There are many different ways and means for providing the little cash outlay for this improvement and it is encouraging to note the number of schools in the county that are going ahead in this work. A clean school house and play ground not only speak well for the teachers but also is a mark of progressiveness for the entire community.

Prof. C. C. Wright in a recent issue of the Progressive Farmer gives some excellent ways of working in the country Sunday school in order to promote attendance and interest. Class organizations for the purpose of enlisting new members in the Sunday school and picnics and oyster suppers are encouraged for the purpose of stimulating interest.

Poor attendance and lack of interest are problems that confront the country Sunday schools. There are several different ways by which these problems may be dealt with successfully. Thorough class organizations with individual responsibility for the enrollment of a new member for the class, and banners given for best class attendance thus promoting a friendly rivalry for largest attendance are good ways of solving the problem. Enthusiasm on the part of the superintendent of the school and the teachers count for much. There are many ways of making Sunday school class work entertaining and instructive if the proper tact is used and adapted to the temperament of the class.

ADVANTAGES OF STUDYING AT SCHOOL

There has been much discussion throughout the State as to whether the pupils in our public schools receive more benefit from the teacher's instruction in school, and from the study of the subject at home than they do by studying under the guidance of a teacher. Prof. Stanley says that in his experience with the pupils of the schools of Hibernia the pupils do more efficient work when they study under the supervision of a teacher and that under this plan of study more pupils are promoted at the end of the year than when the studying was done at home. His contention is that when the studying is done at school the teacher can give just the amount of help necessary to prepare their lessons thoroughly. When the studying is done at home too often the parents do the work and the children stand off enjoying the fun.
