Lee Briles, who has been confined in the jail here for lunacy, has been released on bond given by his brother and has been taken to his home in Cedar Grove township.

Deputy Sheriff Steed went to Rockingham a few days ago and brought back John Ledwell, colored, and placed him in jail here. Ledwell had been arrested by Richmond county officials on a capias issued by Randolph county authorities.

Lineberry school house in Providence township, was burned Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock. The origin of the fire is unknown but it is supposed to have caught from a defective stove flue. School will be suspended in that district for a few days and probably for the entire session.

John Kearns, aged 74, a Confederate veteran, died at his home near High Point Sunday afternoon. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Augustus Sikes, and two sons, Messrs. T. M. of this county and R. L. Kearns, of High Point. The funeral services were conducted at Back Creek church Tuesday morning.

Policeman Bodenhamer, of the Thomasville force, brought W. H. Ledwell to Asheboro Sunday and placed him in jail here. Ledwell is charged with desertion and failure to appear at the December term of court to show good behaviour since September court.

The Secretary of State has chartered the White Manufacturing Company, of Kinston, Guilford county, a cotton corporation chiefly. The incorporators are Dr. G. A. Foster, of Liberty; and Messrs. H. L. Nance and H. A. White, of Winston-Salem.

Deputy Sheriff A. E. Lassiter and Chief of Police Barker, of Randleman, late Wednesday afternoon brought to Asheboro a still which they captured on Pole Cat creek one day last week. When the still place was discovered only the furnace and some beer were to be found. After a diligent search the still itself was found in concealment nearby. No arrests were made.
