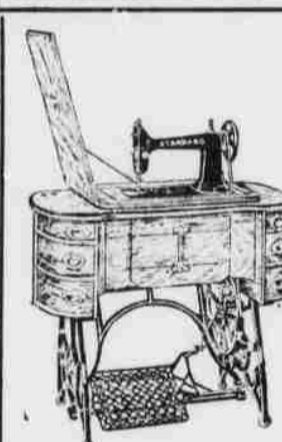

William G. Glasgow Dead
William G. Glasgow was born June 13, 1844, and departed this life January 19, 1916, aged 71 years, 7 months and six days.
